DEMONSTRATOR OF THE MONTH

The demonstration for the July meeting was conducted by Larry Werth. Larry presented the methods he has developed for turning pepper mills. He distributed a detailed handout with step-by-step preparation and turning techniques as well as a set of illustrations on the different stages of the turning process. Larry also handed out pictures of several pepper mill design sizes and styles.

Wood Factoids

This month, we present a factoid on: **African Olivewood**

scientific name - *olea hochstetteri*



Description: Heartwood is light yellowish-tan with irregular streaks, ranging from brown to black, with fine texture and close grain.

Distribution: Montane rain forests at elevations of 6,000 to 9,000 ft; common in Kenya and parts of Zaire but less frequent in Uganda and Tanzania.

The Tree: May reach a height of 80 to 100 ft, but is often smaller; bole rarely straight, heavily fluted, about 15 to 30 ft in length; trunk diameters 2 to 3 ft.

General Wood Characteristics: Heartwood pale brown with irregular dark gray-brown streaks; sapwood up to 2 in. wide, pale yellow, clearly demarcated. Texture fine and even; grain straight or shallowly interlocked, figured; surface slightly oily.

Working Properties: Easy to saw when green, difficult to work by hand, a smooth clean finish is obtained in planing, excellent turning properties, moderate steam-bending properties.

Drying: Timber dries very slowly with a strong tendency to check and warp; honeycomb may develop in thick material if dried too rapidly. Kiln schedule T6-D2 is suggested for

4/4 stock and T3-D1 for 8/4. Shrinkage green to 12% moisture content: radial 4.0%; tangential 6.5%. Movement in service is rated as large.

Preservation: Heartwood moderately resistant to preservative treatments; sapwood permeable.
