Demo Notes

Dan Pfeifer – Texture the Rhythm and Beauty of Nature
Dan shared that he is heavily influenced by the words of a woodcarving
Priest. The advice he received was to "be attentive". Dan strives to be



attentive to the texture in everything... trees, flowers, animals, buildings... everywhere you look. There are basically two types of natural and visual. A good example of visual is painting. The paint tricks your eyes to see texture. Natural texture is a surface treatment that you can feel.



Dan went through a series of photos to show items with texture, explaining techniques such as contrasting texture, the effect of positive and negatives, and how the texture of wood was used as an element of the art piece.


Dan explained the process of applying texture to the "Wheel" piece he brought.

He used exterior texture paint and shavings painted on then ground off to get the effect.

Dan demonstrated the technique he used to tie and the unlike elements of an art piece together. The surface of the wood is textured to relate to the texture of the horn. The art piece also had porcupine quills as another element.



Walnut is Dan's preferred wood species to work with. Primarily because it is dark and white paint provides a good contrast. However, for



wood, paint the section to be textured black, then paint white over the top of the black paint. If using a dark colored wood, paint white first, then paint black over the top of the white paint. Dan uses milk paint. He likes the quick drying time.

The first texture element is a little sanding with 60 grit sandpaper. The goal is to make it look aged, so just sand away a little. Decide which section is going to be chiseled. Cut grooves in the piece on either side of the section to be textured. These grooves provide start and stop cuts for chiseling. Use a chisel to chop out pieces irregularly. Go with the grain. Dan used a flat chisel, however a U or V shaped chisel can also be used and will create a different look.

Dan uses gold or silver gesso to emulate gold or silver leaf. The gesso can be found online at Art Supplies from Dick Blick Art Materials (www.dickblick.com).

Dan noted that you don't have to texture the whole bowl, sometimes accents can be more effective.

Another way of texturing is to use a soft brass wheel on a grinder (power on or off), this creates a sand blasted look.

Other items to inspire and hints:

• String. It can be wound around your piece then glued in place with yellow glue.

• Thin rusted wire. Florist wire can be "rusted" by treating with vinegar and salt. Texture makes a bowel or vessel a one of a kind – that sells!

Dan suggests that as part of your creative process to be attentive to your surroundings and how nature uses texture.

Show-and-Tell

Tom Canfield showed a mesquite stick pen. He shared his method of using a jig on the tailstock to help stabilize the long blank for turning. He drilled a 3/8" hole in a little bit (enough to hold the tenon on the jig) and a 1/8" hole in for 5" to hold the pen insert. Uel Clanton had found Orange Agate a less expensive (about half the price) replacement for Cocobolo in making his tail swatters. Don Kaiser showed a great Cherry bowl. The piece he turned looked bad on the outside, but it turned out to be good on the inside. Harold Dykes made a "Happy" segmented bowl! It is smiling right-side up or upside-down
