Next Meeting, July 12, 2012

MEETING PLACE

Hill Country Turners meet in the basement of the KACC (Kerr Arts & Cultural Center) at 228 Earl Garrett, Kerrville, Texas at 6:30 pm on the 2nd Thursday of the month.

June Meeting

The meeting opened with business: Visitors were Tom Jeffers from Lubbock and Jessica and Amber, granddaughters of Jimmy and Debbie Walker.

Jay Shimek reported a balance of \$3,392.

Will Aymond reported that we are working on a revision of our membership list and that we will be handing out membership lists for everybody to check for the a couple of meetings.

Joe Johnson reported that member sales for the Texas Arts and Crafts Fair was over \$3000. Uel clanton reported he turned 169 tops during the fair and would be happy to train some others in turning the tops so he can get at least some respite in those sessions.

It was wonderful to see Andy Chen, back for a demo from his home in College Station and his Club-home of Gulf Coast Woodturners. About ten years ago, he was at SWAT and Bonnie Klein mentioned the idea of turning other things than wood and mentioned Corian by DuPont. Andy discovered you couldn't buy Corian unless you were certified by the manufacturer, but that lots of Corian installers had cutouts and remnants that they would give away freely. Corian comes in 12 mm thickness but they also won't sell the adhesive. After much testing Andy found that medium viscosity CA glue worked, and the material can be sanded and cut with carbide tools. This process is slower than usual turning and so his demo was limited to gluing a few small squares and turning them into a rough miniature hollow form. In actual practice, Corian is ideal for segmented turning as can be seen by the vessel Andy brought below.

Corian comes with one finished surface and one unfinished-but-fairly thin bottom surface. The bottom surface should be sanded to about a 220 grit finish before gluing. Because of subtle differences in the distribution of Corian pieces that have decorative inclusions in them (i.e. Not just a uniform color), glue joints are least visible when you glue shiny to shiny and sanded to sanded. I don't imagine it makes much difference in a solid color piece. He cautioned that glue should be spread on the blocks to insure that an air bubble is not trapped because CA glue sets up so rapidly. He showed a pattern that would minimize the chance to trap air.



Andy glued the Corian, mounted the block and rounded the block and hollowed it out, a bit. The surprise is that Corian, that looks so much like a rock, being an acrylic resin, ends up giving fine, long shavings off of the tool. (See below.) Corian is not finished by a coating. A beautiful luster is achieved by sanding and then buffing with fine abrasives. Andy also mentioned that very hard tools

and tools that have carbide bits do better and last longer between sharpening. Otherwise, just keep the grinder turned on while you are turning Corian. Darn good show Andy.

July Meeting

July will be a big session. The big show will be a panel discussion on how to chuck/mount/screw/glue unusual pieces on your lathe for turning. **AND** the big:

Show and Tell

Harold Dykes brought a stave segmented vessel that he made to test-out a new hollower he had. The base was made with epoxy on the bottom for more strength. Andy brought some more vessels besides his solid Corian southwest style vessel above. Here is an ash/Corian hollow form and a pair of ash hollow forms.



Dale Lemons brought a disaster. After a world-class catch that broke the cutter on his hollowing tool, he glued what he could find of his mesquite vessel and brought it to show what might have been. It is reassuring to see that even experienced turners can have a bad day. Jerre Williams brought four boxes. One, in the style of Cindy Drozda and others, is of Olive wood with an ebonized poplar finial. A pair of mushroom boxes of Mesquite and Cherry Laurel have medallions of Bocote and poplar respectively. The final Cherry Laurel box has a medallion of off-center arcs with coral inlaid. Bob Franke showed a miniature scoop that was all that was left after a magnificent catch that broke his gouge. This has got to be some kind of planetary misalignment, with Dale and Bob "catch"ing up with some of the rest of us. (Here insert a formal apology from the editor for the pun).



Tom Canfield brought a nice set of bowls; two were of Bradford Pear and Arizona Ash. A third was rather humdrum at first glance, but turned out to have a startling crotch feathering.
