MEETING PLACE

Hill Country Turners meet in the basement of the KACC (Kerr Arts & Cultural Center) at 228 Earl Garrett, Kerrville, Texas at 6:30 pm on the 2nd Thursday of the month.

January Meeting

- -Ken Morton opened the meeting and recognized visitors. Since Will Aymond is having medical problems, Jay Shimek kept up his old place for another meeting and announced that we have about \$5000 pending our payment of our KACC fees.
- -Ken announced a new Texas Mesquite Association that will be having a Mesquite art show at the Shriner's Temple June 28-30.
- -An e-mail from AAW was discussed. The cost of liability insurance for AAW members is on hold because the price is too high. This insurance covers injury to an observer at a demo by an AAW member. The AAW is looking for more affordable insurance, but for now AAW members are not covered.
- -An amendment for the raffle was made to allow only members in good standing (paid up) to enter.
- -The Board has proposed at least one challenge a year. Jerry DeGroot suggested an ornament contest, but other suggestions were encouraged. Jerry has an ash log to donate for whatever challenge is chosen.

George Taylor, our new VP, gave a bang-up demo on laminated turnings, a variant of some of the work by Goeff Whaling of Australia as practiced in the US by Jim McPhail, of North Carolina. (You can see some of his work and a video on www.jimmcphail.com. The idea is to layer various woods and then turn them. Of course, the Devil is in the details.

- o Plan out your turning. Colors and textures are important.
- Use wood that is already surfaced if you can, otherwise you will have to turn each segment as it is added using the lathe and a straight edge or sanding the surface.
- A source of surfaced wood can be found at craft stores (Woodcraft has a cutting board kit)
- Use sharp tools
- o If you use yellow glue, wipe off the excess.
- o If using CA glue, give it time to cure. Accelerator will start at the outside of the glued surface and take a few minutes to work in to the center.

George showed how the various layers of different woods are used to enhance the work. The idea of laminar segmenting is kind of unsettling because the grain is not presented consistently as in larger segmenting. The results were very satisfying. As long as the piece remains relatively small, the wood will not be able to move enough to cause trouble and it is

great looking work. At the end of his demo George gave away a scratch-awl kit as a

challenge to spread the skill.







February Meeting

The February demo will be our past president Joe Johnson showing how to set up a vacuum chuck. He is really adept at this and will present a well documented path to vacuum chucking, should you decide this is for you. He has promised to present a nice handout that we can put into the website for future reference. The reference will be posted on the Projects section of the website. After all, we may not need it now but we may change our mind.

Show and Tell

Larry Walton showed an attractive Mulberry burl bowl within a great natural edged piece. Sue Bates brought a Box Elder bowl and a marble holder that took a lot of marbles to do well. Sue's husband Kirk showed a Mesquite bowl with a smidge of turquoise. Darryl Korman also used turquoise in his Walnut bowl.









Tom Canfield brought three bowls. First is a Huisache bowl that looks a bit like Mesquite, but he says is about ³/₄ the density. The other two are natural edged Mesquite and Mistletoe burl and, on a timely suggestion by Roger Felps, are endgrain bowls. Roger Felps brought a Pecan, Western style vase with burned decoration. In a happy tale, Uel Clanton brought a Cocobolo tail fly-swisher donated by a Wildebeest.









Harold Dykes showed us a beautiful bowl of Yellow Heart, Mesquite, Lyptus, Maple and Ipe. The orientation of the woods, unlike most with-the-grain segmented pieces, included some end-grain features. James Hampton brought a natural edged bowl with a tall foot of Cherry he got from a friend in Missouri. Dale Lemons showed is a really red, and super punky, Box Elder bowl. Ken Morton made a wand of Bacote to finally admit to his friends at work that his computers are really worked by his magic, since they were calling him "Magic Morton" (or "Wonder Wizard" if you look at the engraved MM upside down).









Jerry DeGroot brought three Arizona Ash bowls, one natural edged, and a Cherry Christmas ornament. Really good work guys!
