Jerry De Groot demonstrated two types of texturing tools, Sorby texturing tool and Wagner tools. To texture with the Wagner tools you have to turn the lathe down to a slow speed because they do not have ball bearings. Texturing is a way for Jerry to make box elder with no figure or color in his Christmas ornaments more attractive. Uel Clanton had shown Jerry how to use felt tip markers to add color as well.

Jerry's process for creating the globe part of the ornament started with turning a tenon on a blank. He then chucked the

blank and creates a ball shape, leaving a shoulder. Jerry noted that he found it easier to round the blank rolling the gouge right to left, left to right was less easy. Once the shape is achieved, sand with 80, then 180. Four passes each removes any tool marks. Slow the lathe down. With the Sorby texturing tool, hold the tool at an angle that gives you the results you find pleasing and hold it to the wood. (You will have to practice beforehand to

determine which angle works for you.) Once you have textured the area, emphasize the texture by putting a line (or two) on either side of the area. Color will give it even more pop. Piano wire can be used to make the lines. Varying the thickness of the lines adds more interest. Jerry put a wide line next to the color and a thin line outside of that. For this demo, Jerry did not hollow the globe, but into the special finishing box it went!

The Wagner tools apply a much lighter texture. Jerry likes the Sorby tool best, but the Wagner tools work well on box elder since it is softer than mesquite. Jerry demonstrated the use of the Wagner tools to achieve the same general effect as the Sorby



tool. He noted that the color should be applied first, then make your black lines. By this time, the first globe had been transformed in the special finishing box (wink, wink, nudge, nudge), and Jerry presented a finished textured ornament with finial and all!

Show-and-Tell

Dale Lemons brought a dyed maple bowl that had no great grain so he blended a red and black lacquer to good effect. Tom Canfield showed a nice mahogany plate that had been held in a dovetail that chipped out and was turned off. In church, he was inspired to turn a hollow form that seamlessly blends into a 3-axis turned base. Will Aymond showed us a rolling pin of purple and yellow heart, maple and mesquite that Rochelle says is to keep him in line.



Kirk Bates showed a lamp from old WWII bomber parts (gyro housing?) with a fuel switch re-purposed as the switch and mesquite highlights. Ken Morton had a bracelet of Red Gum from makings he got at the last SWAT. John Stegall made his first try at bottle stoppers from a SWAT kit. The hardest part was the threading, but the job went faster when he used sharpened tools. The woods are persimmon and trash oak. Philip Medghalchi showed an aromatic cedar bowl that had purple highlights. He went to the Wood Central websight and found that there was no way to keep it from changing so he brought it to show the color already changing.



George Taylor showed two Jimmy Clewes workshop projects, a box elder bowl with finish started with shellac thinned with denatured alcohol till it would not soak up any more and finished with Danish Oil. His ash "bowl" featured the open grain with black lacquer and a center with gilding waxes.
