Demo Notes: George Taylor, Face Grain Bowl

- -George demonstrated the elements of turning face grain bowls. He used a tenon in chucking up one bowl and a recess on the other one. One bowl ends up being a box lid and the other bowl a box bottom.
- -George used a screw chuck in the part that will be turned away (when doing the inside of the bowl) to mount his blank. Drill a hole in the blank a little smaller than the screw chuck, then screw the blank on.
- -With the first blank, George trued up the blank, then used a bowl gouge to take away some of the

material to create a recess for chucking. Take out enough material that you are close to the size of the jaws of the chuck. Use a gauge to check as you go. The goal is to create a recess that has as much metal against the wood as possible. For the best grip, you want only a small gap when expanding the jaws of the chuck. As far as the depth of the recess, the key here is the depth. It must be deeper than the foot of your vessel. A good guideline is twice as deep as the foot. So with the recess roughed out on the blank, George rough shaped the bottom of bowl and foot. With the foot now determined, he squared up the recess and cut it to a good depth. George



recommends a trial and error method of creating the recess. Once you get close enough to fitting the chuck, then you make the final clean up cuts.

- -The second blank, George trued up the bottom. George rough shaped the bottom of bowl and the tenon (which will become the top of the box lid). You can check the size of the tenon using a gauge or the chuck itself. A tenon should have a flat face (sometimes called a shoulder) for the jaws to be against and deep enough that jaws can grip without bottoming out on the chuck.
- -He turned the bowl around and chucked it up using the tenon. Either "bowl" could be the lid or the box. This one will serve as a lid to the other. George trued up the face and took away a little of the inside material. He then roughed out more of the outside shape. The outside shape will be finished when box pieces are put together.
- -If you are making a Beads of Courage box, keep in mind the measurements should be 6 to 8 inches wide.

Next, George created the lid ledge. George uses outside calipers to verify the sides of the ledge recess are straight. If the sides of the lid ledge are not straight, it will be difficult to get a good fit with the lip that fits into it. Once the ledge is determined, hollow the inside of the lid to final thickness, sand and finish. It is now ready for joining with other "bowl" which will be the bottom of the box.

-George chucked up the blank using the recess. He trued up the face and created a lip for the box bottom to fit the lid ledge. George hollowed the inside as he would a bowl a little at a time until he gets a good fit. George used the other "bowl" in this case the lid, to trial and error fit to the box bottom. Once the fit is good, put the lid on, bring the tail stock up and shape the outside.

-Once the outside is shaped, take the lid off and hollow the box bottom, sand and finish.

- -Waiting to hollow the inside of the box bottom until the outside is finished provides more design opportunities without being constricted by the shape of the inside.
- -A loose fitting lid is typical for face grain box. The way a snug fit and a loose fit are defined is: a snug fit means you can lift the vessel by the lid and the bottom comes up, a loose fit means you lift by the lid and bottom stays down.
- -Many wood workers believe that finish is not necessary on box lip (where lid fits on). However, if you do put finish on the box tenon, remember that the finish will affect the fit.

Remember to bring your Beads of Courage boxes to the August meeting!

Show-and-Tell:

Ken Morton showed a natural edged bowl of Ornamental Cherry that he said cuts well in spite of lots of bugs. He has a new finish, Formby's Tung Oil. He also brought a pair of finial boxes one an endgrain box, Mesquite, Cocobolo and a copper inlay. The other was Big Leaf Maple with a Texas Blackwood finial. Jerry deGroot brought a flyswatter that he claims is highly functional with a leather swatter. Roger Felps showed a large Mesquite urn/cookie jar.



Uel Clanton showed us the work of a former HCT member, John Roberts. John had made a serviceable Mesquite enclosed vessel and his wife had used a scroll saw to form the pierced design o the lid. George Taylor brought an Ash bowl from an already roughed out stock with one coat of oil. His Box Elder bowl had a great distribution of color and grain. Paul Taylor brought a nice pair of Dogwood bowls, but he was unhappy with the cloudy CA finish and was looking for hints.



Dale Lemons had a box of Maple and Cherry and Turquoise that had a picture inside of Dale in Korea in 1952 to show what 62 years does to a body. Tom Canfield had a Maple bowl with a hole and, rather than plugging up the hole he declared it a yarn bowl. He also showed China Berry and Huisache natural edged bowls. Will Aymond showed us a Mesquite and sterling silver cane that he made a from a parasol. At the request of the customer, he died the Mesqute black.
