### Special Recognition!

**Uel Clanton** was recognized for all that he has done for the club. He was there at the first year and has made everything better in many ways, from turning on the pedal lathe at numerous events (probably the world's fastest top turner), being our representative with KACC for many years, being there at most of our outside projects and working with numerous people in our behalf. He has also mentored many of us with his skill and ideas. Thanks, Uel.

**Demo:** Tom Canfield gave a comprehensive talk about hold wood on the lathe. He



presented spur type drives with one straight or x type as well as stebcenter and safety drives. All are for between centers work in concert with live centers of various shapes and sizes. Depending on the diameter of the workpiece a steady rest may or may not be needed.

Tom went to faceplate and chuck work where the work can be supported by the faceplates, with the live center playing backup for safety in many cases. He added that using live center extenders to add reach and give more room to work is helpful. He

mentioned the four jaw chucks available and the selections of jaws that can be had for various sizes of wood after preparing the piece by establishing a tenon.

Tom mentioned the two types of holding surface of the jaws, serrated and dovetailed. The dovetailed jaw provides the best holding surface when the tenon is well defined to match the inner pitch of the dovetail jaw. The serrated jaws grip the whole tenon well but leave a mark that must be dealt with later. Tom emphasize the need for either type tenon to be flat on the end and slightly shorter than the depth of the jaw, so the upper part of the jaw rests firmly and evenly on the shoulder of the tenon.

It's a good idea to mark with durable paint the center point of the #1 serrated jaw. Before must remove the work for some reason, you can put a pencil mark on the piece at that site first. That way you can put the piece back on the jaws at the #1 mark and, feeling for the serrated indentations with a gentle wiggle as you close the chuck, make it easier to re-center the piece. Its is a sad thing to have to deal with a piece that is no longer running true.

Tom noted that it is important to have clamps or other ways of holding together unsafe blanks such as you would find on burls or cedar or cracked wood. Be careful in the second turning of dried bowls. Don't try to use the old tenon because it will probably not be flat on keep it level and carefully return a proper tenon. Don't trust the tenon on very wet wood. Check the tightness of the chuck every few minutes.

Finally, Tom showed us how to use a jam chuck with pads and a soft ball live center hold to work on the base of a magnolia natural edged hollow form, the big daddy of the form he showed last month at S&T. Thank you Tom.

Marcy Dunn brought a strange device of pine she called a coffee mug, which didn't seem right since the base was so narrow and there was this cutaway down  $\frac{3}{4}$  of the side. Oh... now I see. Tom Canfield Brought a little colored box elder toothpick holder. Really small for somebody who likes to make bigger things, usually.
